
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Each year, thousands of hikers visit KLT's 950-acre Mount Pisgah Conservation Area in Winthrop and Wayne. With two trails to the 803-foot summit and its historic Maine Forest Service fire tower; a recently cleared four-acre highbush blueberry field (see enclosed brochure); and hundreds of acres of woods and wetlands, Mount Pisgah is a popular destination for those who love the outdoors, including hikers, hunters, skiers, and snowmobilers.

As KLT's largest conservation property, Mount Pisgah also protects water quality in the Cobbossee Watershed and provides valuable habitat for many of Maine's wildlife species, including species like bear and moose that need extensive home ranges.

We are in the initial stages of planning a campaign that will allow us to purchase up to three new parcels that total about 150 acres and feature impressive ledges and vernal pools; to build a beautiful new trail along the Mount Pisgah Ridge; and to maintain our current trails and the new highbush blueberry clearing. The map on the right shows one of the three parcels we hope to acquire.

We will officially launch the campaign in March. However, donations for Mount Pisgah can be made in advance, and they make inspirational holiday gifts! Please call the office if you have any questions, and thank you in advance for your support.

In August, after an impressive season of field and office work and research, Toby Smith and Josh Caldwell completed their internships with KLT. I was so thrilled to be back in Maine this summer working with the Kennebec Land Trust as a Conservation Assistant! I saw firsthand lots of exciting changes that had happened through the year - from KLT closing on the Howard Hill project to the great progress being made toward accreditation and beyond. But I was also very grateful for the changes that hadn't happened – the lands I grew to love last summer were, thanks to KLT's protection, still undeveloped, still open to the public, and still the same in so many wonderful ways. Peter Miller Woodland, where I was lucky enough to live again for the duration of my time in Maine, had a new trail, but the lovely lady's slippers remained, the leaves still glowed an almost Peter Miller Woodland Conservation neon green in the setting sun, and the birds still chirped loudly each morning.

I am thankful not only for all the land KLT works so hard to protect, but also for the many projects I got to work on this summer. I helped create a new ADA policy for KLT's trails to increase access for people of all abilities, learned the intricacies of the Land Trust Alliance's accreditation filing requirements thanks to Jane Davis and Donna Buck, carried out property inspections, and created a brochure for the wonderful Judy Kane Preserve on the Kennebec River. My time at KLT has been truly invaluable in setting me up for a career in land conservation.

We did our best to make full use of her excellent writing, field work, and graphic design skills. Avery always had a positive and inquisitive outlook as she plowed through property dedication preparations, property inspections, assessments of KLT's trails to meet Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) regulations, interpretive sign design, and website updates. Summer 2016 interns Josh Caldwell and Toby Smith arrived in June just as Avery was leaving. At the Hutchinson Pond Conservation Area in Manchester, look for a new loop trail with views of Hutchinson Pond and a beautiful bog. Many thanks to 30 Mile River Watershed Association, Camp Vega,

Maranacook Community High School, Kents Hill School, and Monmouth Academy for your help installing bog bridging, clearing trails, and hauling brush from the newly cleared highbush blueberry field at Mt. Pisgah.

LAND FOR MAINE'S FUTURE BOARD REDUCES FUNDING FOR HOWARD HILL BY MORE THAN HALF

In July 2014, with Maine Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife as our agency sponsor, the Land for Maine's Future Board (LMFB) allocated \$337,500 to KLT for our 164-acre Howard Hill project. In October 2015, the funds were awarded to KLT by a vote of 5-2. The Howard Hill project, which is valued for its scenic, natural, community, recreational, and historic values, was thoroughly vetted by the LMFB based upon consistent criteria and a program that has focused on the public benefits of land conservation for twenty-nine years. KLT followed all of the rules and conditions in our LMF agreement. We negotiated this transaction in good faith and expended significant time and resources to bring this project to competition. We are proud of this project, and we appreciate the tremendous support we have received from the City of Augusta, our members, foundations, and business partners.

Last month, on October 25, in an unprecedented reconsideration of its earlier decision, the LMFB voted arbitrarily to reduce KLT's award from \$337,500 to \$163,500. This action, which threatens the integrity of the LMF program, has set back our ability to provide public access to Howard Hill for hiking, snowshoeing, bow-hunting, mountain biking, and community programs that benefit people of all ages and incomes. Despite this challenge, we remain committed to the project. We will continue to work with the City of Augusta and for the people who live in and visit Maine's Capital.
